SUBJECT: KDOT presentation regarding the K-10 Corridor Capacity Improvements Project

PROJECT BACKGROUND/DESCRIPTION:

The K-10 Corridor Capacity Improvements Project ("Project") was announced in December 2021 as part of the Kansas Department of Transportation's (KDOT) Eisenhower Legacy Transportation Program (IKE).

The K-10 corridor is a 16.5-mile stretch of state highway from the Douglas/Johnson County line to I-435 in Johnson County, Kansas. Spanning the cities of De Soto, Lenexa, and Olathe, the corridor supports existing and future redevelopment in eastern Kansas and the Kansas City metropolitan area. Major educational institutions, industrial areas, new high-tech businesses, office and commercial sites, and residential areas are located along this corridor.

KDOT has embarked on an evaluation of alternative solutions to improve safety, relieve congestion, and enhance K-10 highway's role in supporting existing and future development in the corridor. The Project will consider capacity (widening), improvements to existing interchanges (Cedar Creek Parkway and Prairie Star Parkway in Lenexa), alternatives for new interchanges (Clare Road and Lone Elm Road in Lenexa), system improvements to the K-10 and K-7 interchange, as well as evaluating the addition of express lanes and a tolling study to fund new lanes from Cedar Creek Parkway to I-435.

Additional details can be reviewed on the Project's <u>website</u>. Representatives of KDOT and HNTB will present an update on the Project.

The 2023 Exterior Grant Program has concluded. Staff will present the 2023 program results, as well as review the previous three years of the program since it was restructured in 2021.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS/FUNDING SOURCES:

The FY 2023 Budget included \$90,000 for the Exterior Grant Progam. Grants were made to 22 applicants totaling \$85,971.

MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 10, 2023 LENEXA COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE MEETING COMMUNITY FORUM, 17101 W 87th STREET PARKWAY LENEXA, KS 66219

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Boehm called the meeting to order at 7 PM.

ROLL CALL

Councilmembers Karlin, Eiterich, Nicks, Nolte, Roh, Arroyo, Sayers, and Denny were present with Mayor Boehm presiding.

Staff present included Beccy Yocham, City Manager; Todd Pelham, Deputy City Manager; Mike Nolan, Assistant City Manager; Scott McCullough, Community Development Director; Sean McLaughlin, City Attorney; Jennifer Martin, City Clerk; and other City staff.

APPROVE MINUTES

Councilmember Roh made a motion to approve the July 11, 2023 Committee of the Whole meeting draft minutes and Councilmember Eiterich seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

DISCUSSION

1. Recommended fiscal year 2024-2028 Capital Improvement Program

Nate Blum, Chief Financial Officer, reviewed the budget principles specific to the Capital Improvement Program (CIP). He said the proposed 2024-2028 CIP funds 48 projects totaling \$275.2 million. Of those projects, 18 projects are new and total \$48.6 million with the remaining 30 projects totaling \$226.6 million.

Mr. Blum said the CIP funds strategic priorities, plans for economic pressures, lowers borrowing costs and preserves financial flexibility, allocates funds built up over time in the Capital Improvement Fund, and focuses on the preservation and maintenance of City infrastructure. He noted that all previous and future collections of the County (Courthouse) 1/4-cent sales tax are dedicated to the Lenexa Justice Center Project. He added that maintenance projects include the Pavement Management Program, the Bridge Maintenance Program, Stormwater Infrastructure Replacement, the Sidewalk and Trail Repair Program, the Lackman Road Wall Replacement Study, and the IT Infrastructure Replacement Program.

Mr. Blum reported the following key assumptions:

 the estimated mill levy for the Debt Service Fund is 5.033 in fiscal year (FY) 2024 with planned reductions to 4.161 by FY 2028;

- the estimated mill levy for the General Fund is 22.339 mills;
- the Stormwater Service Charge is \$109 per equivalent dwelling unit, and
- the City Council approves a General Fund transfer of \$8 million in reserves.

Mr. Blum reviewed the fund reserve allocations, reporting transfers of General Funds in the amount of \$5 million to the Pavement Reconstruction Project and \$3 million to the Capital Improvement Fund; increasing the annual transfer of Stormwater funds to capital projects as a match for Johnson County Stormwater Management Program funding; and the transfer of Transient Guest Tax to fund capital projects that promote tourism. He said that 72% of the CIP is funded by General Fund revenues (\$88.9 million), General Obligation Bonds (\$65.3 million), and the 3/8-cent sales tax (\$44.7 million). The recommended CIP allocates the 3/8-cent sales tax to Rec Center debt service (\$14.2 million), the Pavement Management Program (\$24 million), and the Ad Astra Pool Project (\$8 million). He reviewed the 2024-2028 CIP funding sources by line item.

Mr. Blum reviewed the capital expenditures, reporting that 78% of the CIP is expended on streets/bridges/traffic projects (\$122.2 million) and facility projects (\$91.8 million). He said the major projects include the Lenexa Justice Center (\$73 million), the Pavement Management Program (\$44.9 million), 83rd Street Improvements (\$13.7 million), and the Lenexa Old Town Activity Center (\$12.2 million). He reviewed the total expenditures by category.

Mr. Blum explained how to read and use the CIP document.

Staff from the associated departments presented each CIP project, explaining the project's status and cost, and answering questions from the Governing Body. The complete list of projects is located on the City's <u>Capital Improvement Program</u> webpage or can be requested from the Finance Department.

Beccy Yocham, City Manager, reviewed the list of projects that are high priority, but unfunded.

Ms. Yocham reviewed the proposed CIP calendar that includes a Planning Commission CIP review on November 6th, a Public Hearing at the November 7th City Council meeting, and the Governing Body's consideration of CIP adoption at the November 21st City Council meeting.

ADJOURN

Councilmember Nolte made a motion to adjourn and Councilmember Roh seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

The meeting adjourned at 8:07 PM.

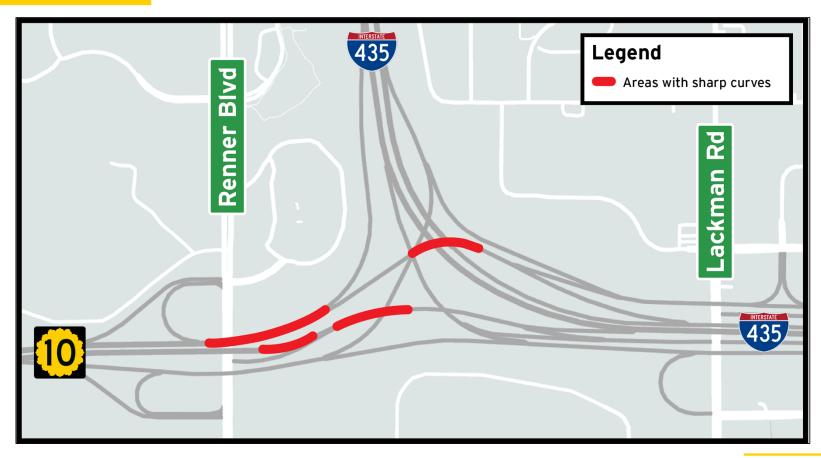

Existing Conditions Roadway Deficiencies



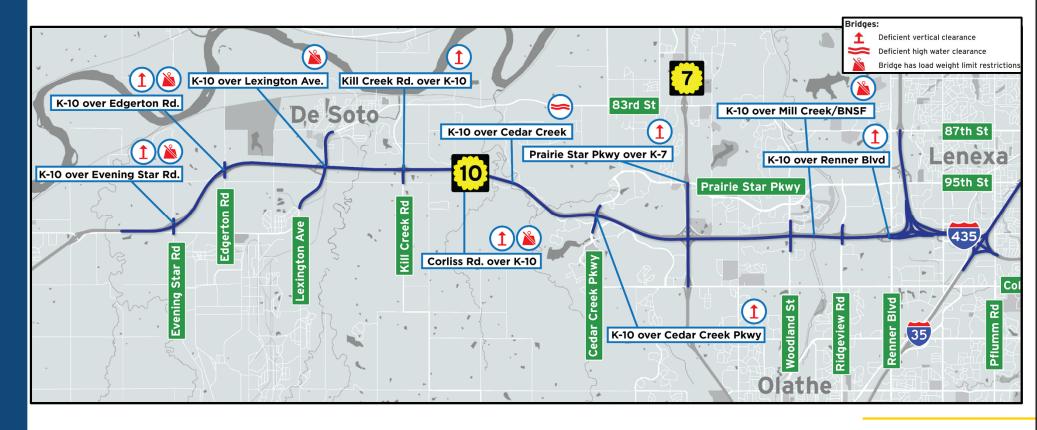






Existing Conditions Bridge Deficiencies

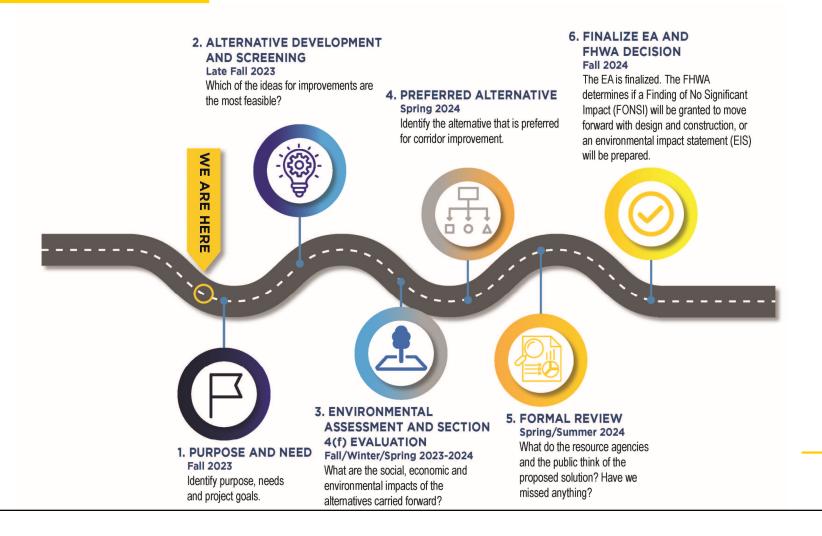

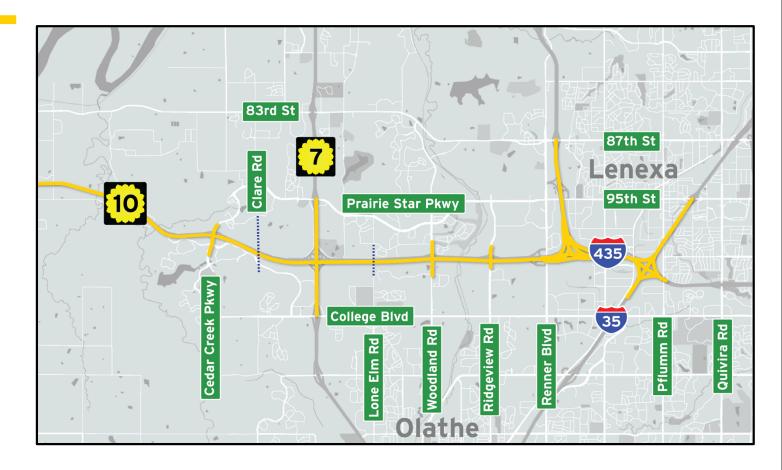

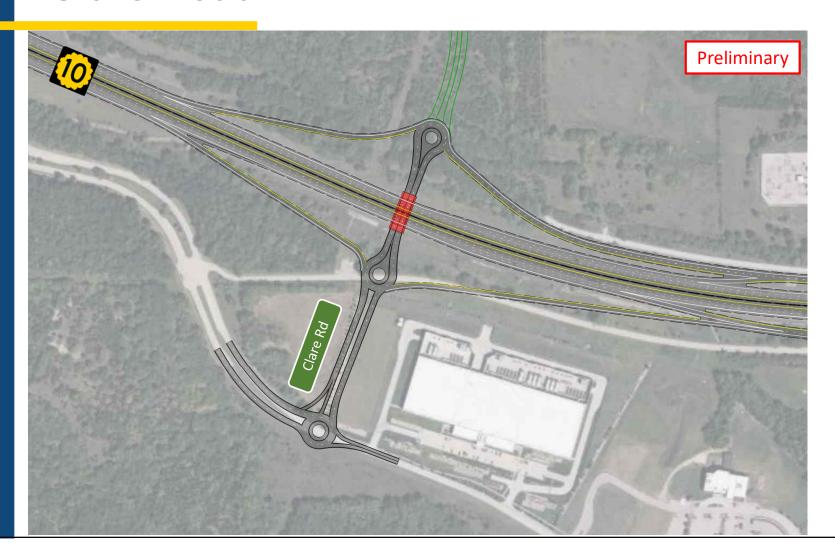

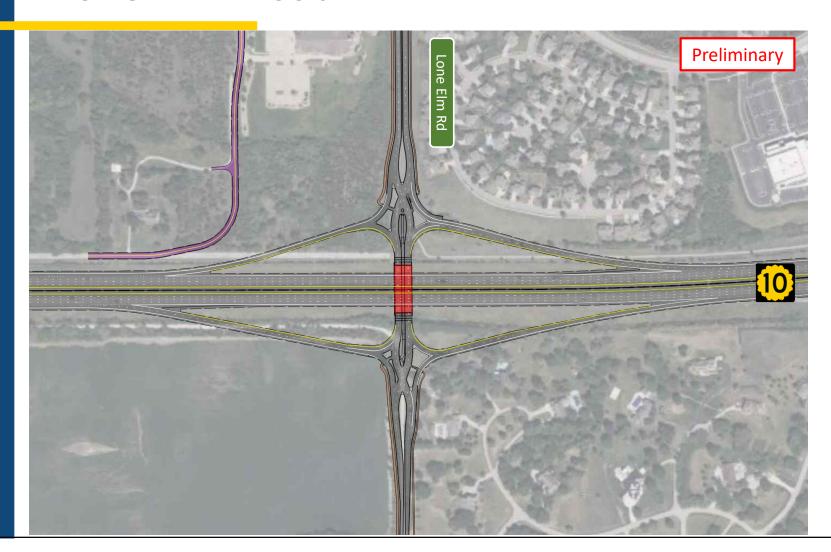






Lone Elm Road

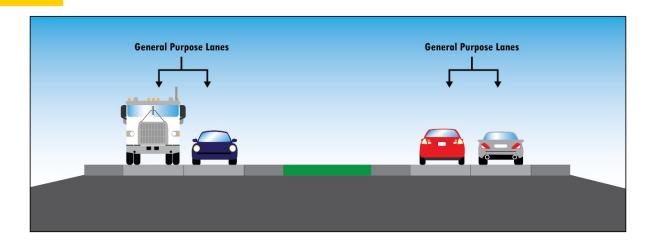

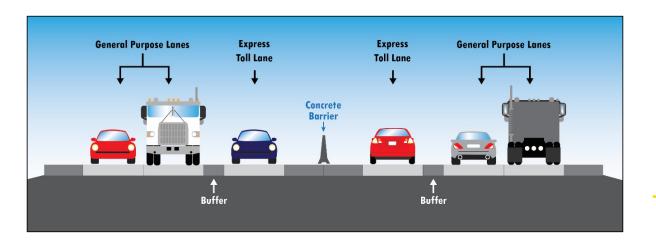




Express Lanes Concept

Toll Project Requirements KSA 68-20, 120



KSA 68-20, 120 grants authority to KDOT to develop toll projects

- No existing lane of any state highway can be tolled
- Tolls shall be charged on <u>all users</u> of the toll facility regardless of class, size, or kind of traffic
- Must include at least 1 public meeting
- All toll <u>revenue must remain</u> with that roadway

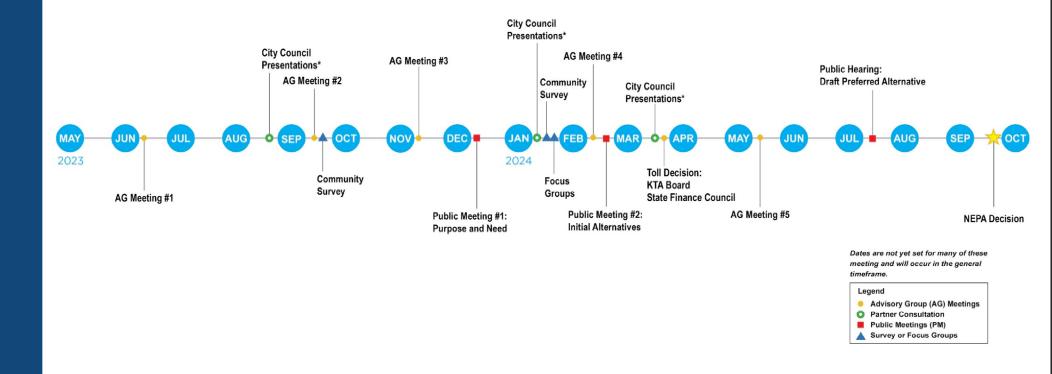

Overview

- The Exterior Grant Program exists to incentivize reinvestment in Lenexa's older homes.
- A recipient may receive a 50% match in funds up to \$5,000 to put towards a renovation project on the exterior of their home that provides a neighborhood benefit.
- Properties are eligible based on age and value of the home.
- Where demand exceeds funding, priority is given to the oldest homes first.
- Funding for 2023 was \$90,000.



Program Revision History

- Pre-2020, the Exterior Grant Program was only applied to Neighborhood Revitalization District areas and had a max reimbursement of 15%.
- Post-2020 the program has been revised in the following ways:
 - Eligibility based on home value & age
 - Included additional types of repairs (fences, decks, solar panels, removal or repair of pools)
 - Increased max reimbursement to 50% of investment up to \$5,000.
 - Removed reimbursement for insurance claims (roofs).



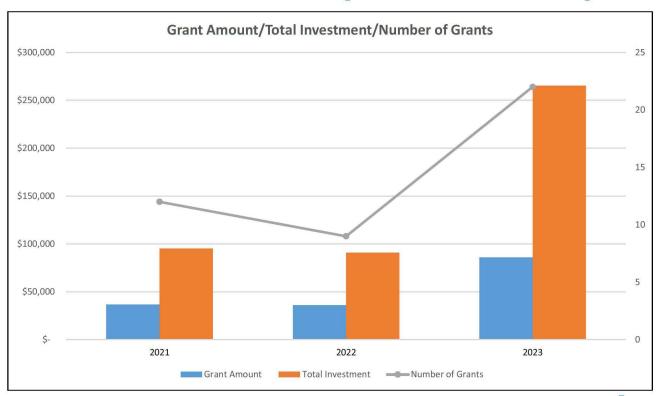

- City Council decreased the qualifying home-value and age percentile from 50% to 25% to narrow the applicant pool starting with the 2022 program year.
- The homes invested in were built between 1890 and 1973.
- The home values ranged from \$144,200 \$292,200



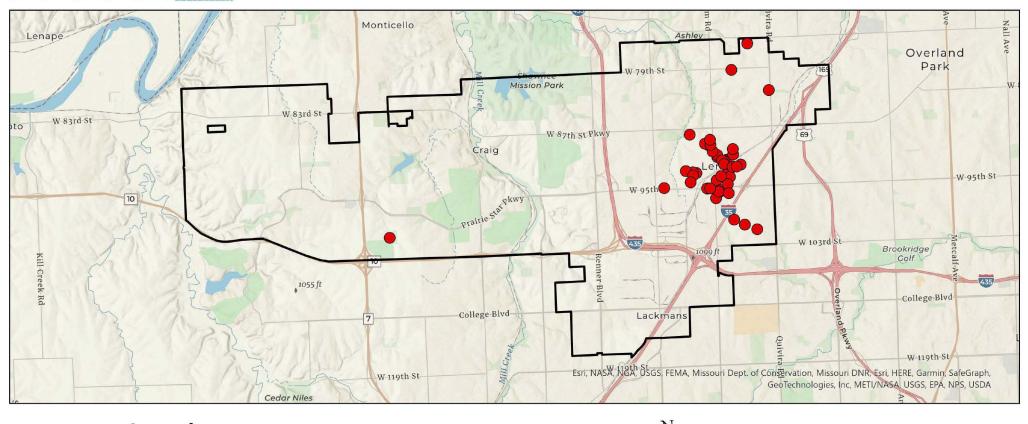
3 Year Data (2021-2023)







Exterior Grant Recipients 2021-2023



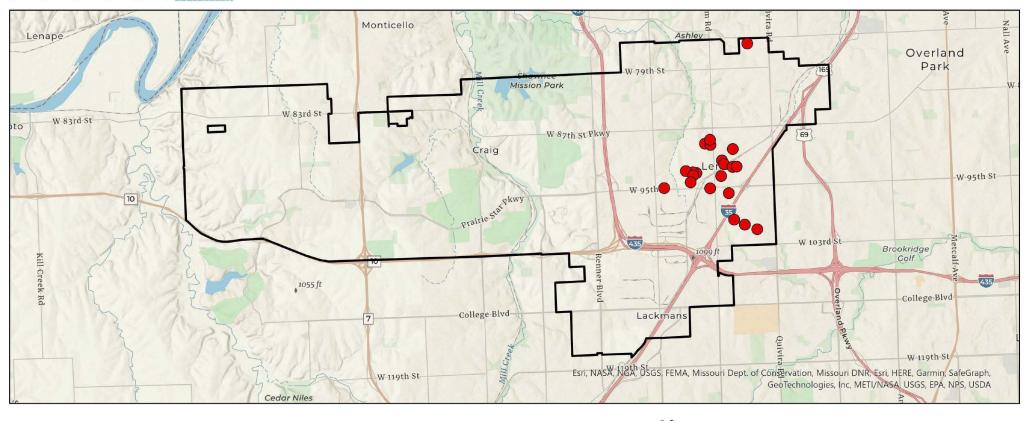

Looking Ahead: 2024

- Funding for the program will remain at \$90,000.
- The qualifying criteria will be homes valued at or lower than \$323,500 and built in or before 1977.
- Applications will be accepted March 1 April 15.
- Projects must be completed by October 2024 to receive reimbursement.
